Purpose of Presentation:

During the session, Bernard Howard, the tribal coordinator for the Bureau of Ocean Energy Management's Office of Environmental Programs (BOEM/OEP), provided an overview of the BOEM/OEP division and insights into the responsibilities of his coordinator role, both within BOEM divisions and in collaboration with Native American tribes.

The conversation transitioned to broader discussions surrounding Tribal concerns with BOEM's siting process, how the bureau intends to implement its newly released "Final North Atlantic Right Whale and Offshore Wind Strategy" and how whale mortality rates are on the rise which may be related to new offshore wind construction activities.

Discussions also included the subject of offshore wind developers who were subject to regulations in other countries which were founded in International Law (such as UNDRIP) which recognizes "Moral Force" as a human rights instrument.

While BOEM did not specifically provide any further details as to how they intend to implement their North Atlantic Right Whale strategy relevant to vessel strikes, they simply committed to continuing to consult with USET tribes remain concerned that there hasn't been enough concrete planning as to how the strategy will be implemented.

BOEM did not comment or offer any insight into implementing stronger regulations onto offshore wind developers which mimic any of the principles under the United Nations Declaration of the rights of Indigenous Peoples. (UNDRIP)

The committee discussed the potential need for the creation of a Northeast Tribal Caucus which could be organized like a similar structure implemented by West Coast tribal nations in their own caucus. Such a organization could factor into funding and conditional approaches towards maritime Management positions. Having USET support in such an initiative would also give the Caucus more weight.

The Shinnecock Tribal representatives conveyed a concern to BOEM regarding New York City hauling trash and waste by barge and dumping within state waterways for a great number of years.

Shinnecock concern is that when Offshore wind developers begin to bring their electric cables through New York State waterway jurisdiction, the waste on the ocean floor would be disturbed and create an environmental emergency.

Shinnecock would like a full environmental study completed before ocean bottom disturbing activities occur.

BOEM made a commitment to look into Shinnecock concerns regarding environmental hazard by working with EPA or other relevant federal agencies to address the concern raised by the Shinnecock Nation.
