What is the Survey of Native Nations?

The survey focuses on financial administrative data that includes revenues collected and expenditures spent by tribal governments as well as a few additional non-financial questions. Below are general data collection categories:

What are we trying to accomplish through the Survey of Native Nations?

- Address the <u>economic invisibility</u> of Native nations and Native communities through data-informed analyses.
- Model the <u>power of partnerships</u>, trust building and tribal data sovereignty through a multi-stakeholder data initiative
- Provide the data analysis for Native nations, USET and CICD to articulate an accurate narrative of the individual and collective <u>economic contributions of tribes</u>
- Understand <u>how policies and practices have influenced</u> how and to what degree tribes raise revenues
- Demonstrate the <u>comprehensive delivery of tribal government services and employment</u> to citizens and their local communities

Why is CICD well positioned to offer the Survey of Native Nations?

- <u>Independent:</u> The Federal Reserve is an independent, non-partisan and respected institution that conducts objective research.
- <u>Data Stewards:</u> The Federal Reserve has a long history of collecting, analyzing and safeguarding sensitive and confidential data.
- <u>Commitment:</u> The Minneapolis Fed is committed to pursuing a strong and inclusive economy that works for all, including Indian Country.
- <u>Capacity:</u> CICD's recent expansion brought in technical and Indian Country specific expertise to help close data gaps including launching the Survey of Native Nations
- <u>Invested:</u> Through its Research and Data Use Principles, CICD is invested in honoring tribal data sovereignty



How is tribal data protected?

- As an independent institution within the Federal Reserve System, the Federal Reserve Bank of Minneapolis has a long history of secure data collection and handling
- In addition to adhering to Federal Reserve Bank of Minneapolis policies governing data privacy and security, CICD and our partners follow Principles of Research and Data Use that were co-created with tribes to ensure respect for tribal data sovereignty and governance in our research and data collection.
- CICD will not release to the public any confidential information that is individually identifiable to a specific survey respondent.
- CICD considers confidential information to include all data submitted by a survey respondent that the respondent keeps private or closely held and that is not available to the public.
- CICD analysis of aggregated respondent data may be made available to the public











REVENUES FROM TRIBAL BUSINESSES VARY





\$8.9M (2.2%) from tribally owned enterprises \$3.9M (6.7%) from taxes \$198.2M (91.1%) from all other sources \$210.9M total All responding Montana tribes, summed [mock data]



\$8.3M (0.6%) from tribally owned enterprises \$3.0M (1.9%) from taxes \$117.0M (97.5%) from all other sources \$128.3M total



SNN Project Timeline

• Collaborate with USET to recruit member tribes to participate in the survey Spring 2024 • Hold information sessions and conduct outreach to tribal government stakeholders Begin to onboard 'early adopters' into the survey Host onboarding virtual event with participating partner tribes **Summer 2024** • Work with tribal govt personnel to onboard into security protocols & prepare for survey responses • Continue tribal government outreach & recruitment efforts Survey launches August 2024 Provide ongoing technical assistance and support for completing the survey Last call for survey participation Close survey in early fall Fall 2024 Potentially share initial aggregated USET data for fall meeting (TBD) • Conduct analysis and prepare final reports • Finish final reports and share back with tribal government partners Winter 2024 Complete and deliver USET organizational final report
