






Through mutual respect and understanding, enhance the quality of life in Tribal communities by supporting the Tribes' delivery of transportation programs.

Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) Grant Program

Program Overview

The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) established the Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) discretionary program with \$5 billion in appropriated funds over 5 years, 2022-2026. The SS4A program funds regional, local, and Tribal initiatives through grants to prevent roadway deaths and serious injuries. Over \$3 billion is still available for future funding rounds.

The SS4A program supports the U.S. Department of Transportation's National Roadway Safety Strategy and our goal of zero roadway deaths using a Safe System Approach.

Combining the FY22 and FY23 awards, SS4A has provided \$1.7 billion in Federal funding to over 1,000 communities in all 50 States and Puerto Rico. SS4A funding awarded to date will improve roadway safety planning for about 70 percent of the nation's population.

Funding Opportunities

FY24 NOFO Now Open

The fiscal year (FY) 2024 Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) for Safe Streets and Roads for All grants is open.

The FY 2024 NOFO has multiple deadlines, depending on the grant type:

- April 4, 2024, 5 p.m. (EDT): Deadline #1 for Planning and Demonstration Grants.
- May 16, 2024, 5 p.m. (EDT): Sole deadline for Implementation Grants. Deadline #2 for Planning and Demonstration Grants.
- August 29, 2024, 5 p.m. (EDT): Deadline #3 for Planning and Demonstration Grants. NOFO closes.

Crant Applicant Roadmap

PRE-AWARD

- Applicant registers on SAM.gov and Grants.gov in advance* of application.

 *registration is not immediate
- Applicant searches for <u>USDOT grants</u> on Grants.gov where all USDOT grants are posted with a Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) outlining program eligibility criteria and requirements.
- Applicant applies for funding for a project that meets program requirements before the end of the application window.
- 4 applications and selects programs to award funding based on the stated criteria in the NOFO.



POST-AWARD

8 usbot monitors the project's progress and provides technical assistance and customer support to grantees as needed.

10 Grantee completes all closeout requirements and submits final financial and technical reports.

Grantee reports progress to USDOT throughout the project lifecycle through applicable Project Progress Reports (PPRs) and Federal Financial Reports (SF-425s) as required by USDOT.


