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USET SPF Resolution No. 2025 SPF:006

SUPPORT OF THE CAYUGA NATION IN ASSERTING ITS SOVEREIGN RIGHT TO REGULATE ECONOMIC ACTIVITY WITHIN ITS TERRITORIAL JURISDICTION

WHEREAS, United South and Eastern Tribes Sovereignty Protection Fund (USET SPF) is an intertribal organization comprised of thirty-three (33) federally recognized Tribal Nations; and

WHEREAS, the actions taken by the USET SPF Board of Directors officially represents the intentions of each member Tribal Nation, as the Board of Directors comprises delegates from each member's Tribal Nation leadership; and

WHEREAS, the Cayuga Nation is a participating member of USET SPF, and is governed by the federally recognized Cayuga Nation Council and the Nation's Federally Recognized Representative, Clint Halftown; and

whereas, the Cayuga Nation reports that it commenced litigation in the United States District Court for the Northern District of New York seeking a ruling that the State of New York's gaming activities within the Cayuga Nation's territorial jurisdiction are prohibited by the Indian Gaming Regulatory Act (IGRA); and

WHEREAS, the Cayuga Nation asserts that, in 1794, the United States Government formally recognized the Cayuga Nation and set aside 64,015 acres as its federally recognized Reservation, which has not been disestablished to this date; and

WHEREAS, the Cayuga Nation asserts that the Cayuga Nation Council, exercising the right of self-government and its exclusive right to regulate gaming within its Reservation pursuant to IGRA, enacted a Gaming Ordinance, subsequently approved by the National Indian Gaming Commission, permitting Class II gaming; and

WHEREAS, the Cayuga Nation asserts that it operates several Class II gaming facilities within its Reservation; and

WHEREAS, the Cayuga Nation asserts that the State of New York operates, without Cayuga Nation authorization, several Class III games, including instant lottery and draw lottery, and has issued a license to an operator to provide mobile lottery tickets within the Reservation; and

WHEREAS, the Cayuga Nation asserts that New York's gaming activity within the Reservation is a violation of IGRA; and

WHEREAS, the Cayuga Nation asserts that it demanded the State of New York cease its unlawful gaming activities within the Reservation and the State of New York did not respond to the demand and continues, to today, its activities; and

WHEREAS, the Cayuga Nation reports that the State of New York moved to dismiss the Nation's litigation and argued that IGRA does not apply to states and that the State of New York is

permitted, as a matter of law, to conduct gaming within the Reservation free from regulation of the National Indian Gaming Commission or the Cayuga Nation, which motion

to dismiss remains pending before the Court; and

WHEREAS, USET SPF supports the Cayuga Nation's right to litigate to enforce its exclusive right

under IGRA and its inherent sovereignty to regulate all gaming on lands located within the

Nation's territorial jurisdiction; and

WHEREAS, in December 2010, the United States recognized the rights of its First Peoples through its

support of the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP), whose provisions and principles support and promote the purposes of this resolution;

therefore, be it

RESOLVED USET SPF strongly supports the Cayuga Nation in its efforts to assert any sovereign

rights, as codified in IGRA, to regulate gaming on lands within the Nation's territorial

jurisdiction; and be it further

RESOLVED USET SPF calls upon the State of New York to recognize the supremacy of IGRA as

federal law and cease any illegal gaming operations within the Nation's territorial

jurisdiction.
